MEMORANDUM

Complainant, a federal criminal supervisee, claims that in September 2016, certain United States probation officers spoke disparagingly about him to his employer, causing him to lose his job. He contends that he complained to the subject United States District Judge's office about the probation officers' behavior, and that less than a week later, he was arrested for violating supervised release conditions. Without presenting any evidence in support of the assertion, complainant alleges that the judge caused the arrest warrant to be issued in retaliation for his complaints about the probation officers.

A review of the record indicates that the judge was not involved in any way in either the Petition for Revocation or the arrest warrant. Such a conclusory allegation is insufficient to raise an inference of misconduct, and is therefore subject to dismissal under 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(iii).

An order dismissing the complaint is entered simultaneously herewith.
